Looking ahead, we remain firmly grounded in our mission: to provide quality, comprehensive health and wellness services in an LGBTQ-focused environment while preserving the dignity and improving the quality of life of the individuals we serve. We will continue expanding access, strengthening equity, investing in our people, and advocating for the communities that depend on us.

2025 AT A GLANCE

A Year of Stabilization, Growth, and Renewed Momentum

Mazzoni Center's 2025 story is one of increased demand, improved operational systems, and renewed community presence. With a keen focus on our core mission, we made significant progress in expanding access to whole-person care, improving patient flow, and strengthening organizational stability. While challenges remain, the year marked a turning point across multiple areas of service delivery and internal operations. The following highlights summarize the most meaningful advancements.

Key highlights of 2025 include:

- Expanded patient capacity across multiple service lines
- Increased availability of behavioral health services
- Operational improvements that reduced wait times and improved appointment completion
- Strengthened partnerships across the city and region
- Continued emphasis on staff engagement, training, and communication
- Stabilization and early improvement of the financial position

1. Expanded patient capacity across multiple service lines

Demand for LGBTQ-affirming care remained strong throughout 2025, and Mazzoni Center increased its capacity to meet that demand. Across primary care, behavioral health, and specialty services, more patients were seen each month as scheduling, staffing, and operational workflows improved.

Monthly visit data from November 2024 through October 2025 show consistently high medical visit volume—generally above 2,000 visits per month—and a sharp rise in behavioral health visits over the same period. This reflects both expanded access and increased patient engagement across services.


MONTHLY BEHAVIORAL HEALTH VISITS

Key factors included:

- More efficient scheduling templates
- Increased consistency in provider availability
- Better coordination across departments

These changes created a more predictable, accessible, and responsive care environment for patients.

2. Increased availability of behavioral health services

Behavioral health remained one of the fastest-growing areas of care in 2025. Visit volume increased significantly over the year, reflecting both need and improved access.

Monthly behavioral health visits rose from under 200 visits at the beginning of the period to more than 600 visits per month later in the year. **This growth was driven by:**

- Additional clinician availability
- Improved referral pathways
- Closer integration with primary care
- More efficient scheduling and follow-up systems

Patients continued to seek support for a wide range of needs, including depression, anxiety, trauma, substance use, and social stressors that disproportionately affect LGBTQ+ communities.

3. Operational improvements reduced wait times and improved appointment completion

Throughout 2025, Mazzoni Center implemented targeted operational changes to improve patient experience and streamline care.

Improvements included:

- Revised schedules that increased access
- Increased front-desk staffing at peak times
- Enhanced appointment reminders and follow-up communication
- More coordinated handoffs between departments
- Better alignment between patient demand and available appointment types

These operational changes contributed to higher visit volumes, reduced delays, and more consistent follow-through between appointments. They also helped improve the overall experience for patients seeking timely care.

4. Continued emphasis on staff engagement, training, and communication

Mazzoni Center continued to prioritize staff engagement and workplace culture as essential components of high-quality care. In 2025, the organization expanded professional development opportunities, strengthened internal communication, and implemented new structures for staff feedback.

Survey results showed strong agreement around respect, inclusivity, and patient-centered values, alongside clear areas for continued improvement. Leadership used that information to guide training, policy updates, and communication practices throughout the year.

Investing in staff remains a foundational strategy for improving patient care, strengthening organizational stability, and ensuring that services are delivered in ways that reflect Mazzoni Center's mission and values.

5. FY25 financial results demonstrate financial stabilization

After several challenging years, the organization took a meaningful step forward in FY24 and entered FY25 with a renewed focus on stabilizing financial operations and strengthening long-term sustainability. The FY24 audit reflects both the scale of the financial challenges the organization has faced and the important progress already underway. Most importantly, that momentum carried into FY25 with clear signs of stabilization.

Preliminary, unaudited FY25 financial results indicate that these efforts are beginning to yield tangible results, with the organization ending the year with a modest operating surplus and improved overall financial health. Early indicators also show stronger cash-flow management and continued progress in reducing financial stress, reinforcing confidence in the organization's forward trajectory.

Key operational improvements during this period included:

- Strengthened revenue-cycle processes, improving the accuracy and timeliness of billing



- Optimized coding and clinical documentation, supporting appropriate reimbursement
- Optimized prescription discount program (340B) revenue that helps fund patient care while ensuring compliance
- Enhanced provider productivity and appointment scheduling, particularly in behavioral health
- Budgeting and staffing decisions more tightly aligned with actual service demand


These operational enhancements, combined with strategic streamlining of non-core services and improved departmental efficiency, helped stabilize expenses while supporting growth in patient services. The benefits of the organization's Federally Qualified Health Center Look-Alike (FQHC-LAL) designation, received in late FY23, were more fully realized in FY24 and became an important driver of sustainability throughout FY25.

While final audited FY25 results will provide formal confirmation, early performance strongly suggests a more stable financial position than in recent years, improved operating discipline, and modest positive operating performance. This progress represents a critical milestone in restoring financial strength and advancing long-term sustainability in support of Mazzoni Center's mission—and in ensuring continued access to life-saving, comprehensive care for the community.

Risk Reduction in Practice — Stay Safer Philly

Expanding Access, Reducing Barriers, Supporting Community Health

In 2025, Mazzoni Center expanded its risk-reduction work by installing a Stay Safer Philly vending machine at the Bainbridge Street location. The machine, implemented in partnership with Philadelphia's Department of Public Health, represents a growing national model for increasing access to life-saving supplies through low-barrier, judgment-free options.

The machine provides free access to essential items including naloxone, safer-sex kits, wound-care supplies, fentanyl test strips, menstrual products, and hygiene items. Importantly, the machine is available beyond traditional clinic hours, ensuring that support is accessible when individuals need it most.

Patients and community members have responded positively to the resource, noting the ease of access, privacy, and practical value. Staff have observed increased engagement from individuals who may not otherwise seek services during business hours or who prefer a private, self-service option.

The initiative aligns with Mazzoni Center's commitment to meeting people where they are, reducing harm, and supporting individuals in staying safe and healthy. It also complements the organization's broader efforts to provide trauma-informed care, substance-use support, and behavioral health services.

Behavioral Health Services Expand to Meet Demand

Integrated Mental Health Support for LGBTQ+ Communities

Behavioral health continued to be one of the fastest-growing service areas in 2025 as the community's need for affirming, trauma-informed mental health support remained high. This year, Mazzoni Center strengthened its integrated care model by shifting to a structure in which individuals receiving behavioral health services are first established as primary care patients within the medical center. This approach ensures that care is fully coordinated and truly centered on the whole person—addressing both physical and mental health needs in one trusted setting.

Mazzoni Center's Behavioral Health team provides therapy, psychiatric services, crisis intervention, and integrated

care for individuals navigating a wide range of emotional and psychological challenges. Patients seek support for depression, anxiety, trauma, substance use, discrimination-related stress, social isolation, and complex interpersonal challenges that disproportionately affect LGBTQ+ people. Many individuals rely on behavioral health services as part of a coordinated plan involving primary care, case management, and specialist services.

In response to persistent barriers to access care across the broader healthcare system, Mazzoni Center is prioritizing behavioral health services for those who are uninsured, enrolled in Medicare or Medicaid, or supported through Ryan White funding. This commitment ensures access to high-quality, affirming mental health care for individuals who may be unable to obtain services elsewhere.

To meet growing demand, Mazzoni Center dramatically expanded its capacity in 2025 by adding seven new therapists to the Behavioral Health team. This significant growth has increased appointment availability, reduced wait times, and allowed the program to serve a growing number of clients. The organization also strengthened collaboration between behavioral health and medical teams, reinforced training in trauma-informed approaches, and implemented systems that support continuity of care.

This fully integrated model ensures that patients experience care as comprehensive, coordinated, and respectful of the many factors that influence overall wellness. Staff report that individuals often express relief in being able to receive affirming mental health care in a setting where their identities and lived experiences are understood without explanation.

The program's continued growth reflects both the community's trust and Mazzoni Center's deep commitment to mental health as an essential component of whole-person care.

Expanding Access to Long-Acting Injectable PrEP

Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis, commonly known as PrEP, is a highly effective medication that prevents HIV transmission when taken as prescribed. Traditionally offered as a daily pill, PrEP has transformed HIV prevention nationwide. However, daily adherence, stigma, privacy concerns, and medication fatigue can create barriers for many people. Long-acting injectable PrEP (LAI-PrEP) represents a major advancement by providing continuous protection through an injection administered once every two or six months - eliminating the need for a daily pill and making HIV prevention easier, more discreet, and more reliable for many patients.

While Mazzoni Center's LAI-PrEP program launched prior to 2025, this year we made a determined effort to expand injectable PrEP usage, with a focus on both access and patient volume. Mazzoni Center began offering LAI-PrEP at our Washington West location in addition to Bainbridge, bringing this highly effective prevention option to more patients across the city.

Growth in the program has been substantial. From September 2023 to October 2025, the total number of patients receiving injectable prevention and treatment medications increased from 102 to 484 across both locations - a nearly fivefold increase. This includes growth in Apretude for HIV prevention at both Bainbridge and Wash West, as well as Cabenuva for HIV treatment at Bainbridge.

In 2024 alone, 21.5% of Mazzoni Center patients were seen for PrEP services, accounting for 27.5% of all medical encounters. Upon submitting our data to the federal Health Resources and Services Administration, Mazzoni Center was noted for providing approximately 13% of all PrEP services delivered by Federally Qualified Health Centers across Pennsylvania—highlighting the organization's outsized role in statewide HIV prevention efforts.

To support this rapid growth and ensure patients remain engaged in care, Mazzoni Center also invested in PrEP retention coordinators. These staff play a critical role in supporting appointment adherence, navigating insurance and financial assistance, and addressing barriers that can disrupt continuity of prevention care.

Together, the expansion of LAI-PrEP locations, the dramatic growth in patient participation, and the addition of dedicated retention staff reflect Mazzoni Center's continued leadership in advancing equitable, accessible HIV prevention for LGBTQ+ communities and others at increased risk.

Mazzoni Center Honors Melba Moore



Celebrating a Trailblazer in Culture, Advocacy, and Community Strength

Mazzoni Center's 3rd Annual "Mazzoni Center Honors" paid tribute to Melba Moore, the award-winning singer, actress, and cultural icon whose multi-decade career has been marked not only by artistic achievement but also by a long record of advocacy for civil rights, LGBTQ+ visibility, and public health.

This year's event brought together supporters, community partners, donors, and local leaders for a night of music, magic, and meaning, featuring award-winning performers including Savion Glover, Lisa Fischer, Joy Woods, Felicia Boswell, Low Cut Connie, and more, all hosted by Emmy and Peabody Award-winner, Soledad O'Brien. It was both a celebration of Moore's extraordinary influence and a recognition of the role that artists have long played in advancing social justice and community well-being.

The program highlighted Moore's work on issues including LGBTQ+ rights, HIV/AIDS awareness, and cultural equity. Colleagues and community advocates spoke about Moore's long history of performing at benefits, speaking publicly about discrimination, and using her platform to uplift marginalized communities.

The night also served as a reminder of the enduring connection between creativity and community health. Performances and tributes emphasized the ways in which artistic expression provides visibility, strengthens resilience, and helps individuals imagine new futures.

Funds raised through the event support Mazzoni Center's affirming health and wellness services, including primary care, behavioral health, and HIV prevention and treatment. Supporters emphasized how this annual gathering has become an essential opportunity to uplift stories of leadership and inspiration while ensuring that care remains inclusive and accessible.

World AIDS Day with Dr. Anthony Fauci


World AIDS Day has long been a cornerstone of Mazzoni Center's work—honoring lives lost, celebrating scientific progress, and reaffirming the ongoing effort to end the HIV epidemic. In 2025, Mazzoni Center hosted a powerful and far-reaching World AIDS Day program featuring a keynote conversation with Dr. Anthony Fauci, whose decades of leadership have shaped the global response to HIV/AIDS and public health more broadly.

The program was hosted by Karine Jean-Pierre and the program closed with a special musical performance by Rufus Wainright, setting a moving and resonant tone for the evening. An outstanding panel discussion complemented Dr. Fauci's remarks and included Mazzoni Center's Chief Medical Officer, Dr. Stacey Trooskin, alongside other respected public health and community leaders.

Dr. Fauci reflected on the historical arc of the HIV epidemic, the scientific milestones that transformed treatment, and the nationwide efforts to reduce new infections. His remarks echoed themes he has emphasized throughout his career: the importance of equitable access to prevention and treatment, the urgent need to address disparities in marginalized communities, and the essential role played by community-based organizations in driving progress.

Reflection, Public Health Leadership, and the Ongoing Fight for Equity



He also spoke to the evolution of public understanding of HIV—from the fear and stigma of the early years to today's treatment landscape, where HIV is a manageable chronic condition for those with access to care. His participation underscored both the national and global significance of sustained, community-centered HIV work.

Mazzoni Center clinicians and community partners shared their perspectives on the current state of HIV in Philadelphia, emphasizing the need for trauma-informed care, expanded access to testing and prevention, and continued advocacy to ensure that scientific advances reach those most affected.

The event reached a truly nationwide—and even global—audience, with 22 of the country's leading LGBTQ and HIV health centers and organizations signing on as presenting partners. This broad coalition reflected the collective commitment to equity, collaboration, and shared leadership in the fight to end the HIV epidemic.

Together, the program reinforced Mazzoni Center's long-standing leadership in HIV prevention, testing, treatment, and support services. It also highlighted the enduring importance of honoring history, advancing science, and centering equity in every aspect of HIV care.
